Flower bundles are hung upside down for two weeks. "After two weeks hanging upside down, we wait for a sunny day to put bundles in boxes we store in our warmed barn until flowers are needed here at the Market," she said. "We keep our barn warm because dried flowers keep their colors best when warm."

Also each spring and summer, the family sells farm fresh, just picked, flowers and vegetables.

"During the summer break from high school, my 16-year-old brother Christopher sells vegetables out on Pike Place," Jasengnou explains. "Beginning around June, weather depending, we have carrots and lettuce, corn and peppers, bok choy and many

other specialty vegetables we picked the afternoon before we sell them here the following morning."

The Jasengnou family is Hmong, the aboriginal people of Laos, a country in southeast Asia. "We are Hmong. My parents came to America because of the war in Laos," she said. "My mother was sponsored by people in Pennsylvania, so she first moved there before moving to California."

She tells the story of her dad, who lived here already, who was visiting his California relatives when he met her mom. They fell in love and married. The subsequent family, including eight-year-old sister Meshelle, all lives here."

The Jasengnous remain close to the Pennsylvania sponsors "who just sent photos to my parents," she said. "Even after all these years, they all stay in touch and are close."

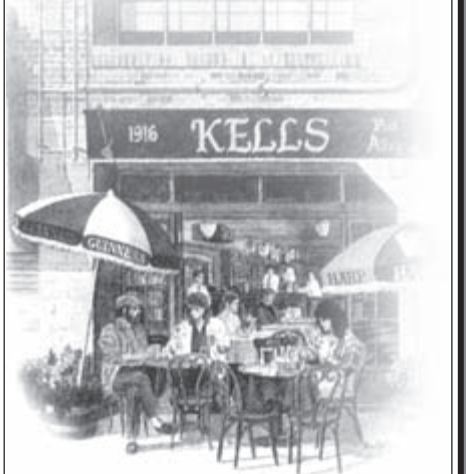
